For one book, please complete the letter-writing activity below. For your other book, choose and complete <u>one</u> creative presentation from the table below.

# Book 1 Activity: Letter to My Teacher (required)

Students will compose a letter to their teacher (Mrs. C ) describing the book. This typed or handwritten letter should include the following components:

- Introduction to the book: Title, author, and genre.
- Summary: A brief description of the characters, plot, and resolution.
- Personal opinion: A paragraph detailing your personal thoughts about the book. Did you enjoy the book? Why or why not? What kind of reader would enjoy this book?

## Book 2 Activity: Creative Presentation (choose one)

Create a playlist that represents your book, along with an album cover. Write a brief explanation of each of your song choices.	Write several diary entries from the perspective of a character in your book. Date the entries so that they are spread throughout the timeline of the novel.	Make a comic strip to retell a book that you read this summer. You may use a comic strip website or hand draw your comic.
Write and record a song from the perspective of the narrator or main character.	Design a fictional yearbook page or scrapbook page for a character from one of your books. This may be completed digitally or on paper.	Be a character therapist. Identify a character's big fear or issue, and address how they overcame it. This may be written out in paragraph form, written as a script, or acted out and filmed.
Make a timeline of the important events in the book. This may be completed digitally or handwritten.	Write a series of poems about one of your books from the perspective of the narrator or main character.	Create a movie poster for your book. Tell what actors would play the major roles, and write a brief enticing summary of the book that would draw in viewers.
